MISSION

The Princeton Club of Chicago exists to build and maintain among local alumni a high level of awareness of and involvement in activities related to Princeton University and its alumni, students, faculty and administration (the "Princeton Family"). Ongoing functions include: finding and encouraging qualified applicants to apply to Princeton and to matriculate if accepted; encouraging broad participation in Annual Giving and the Club Scholarship Fund; encouraging interaction, communication, and networking among the "Princeton Family" at the local level via a wide array of educational, cultural, community service, and Princeton-related entertainment programs; and enhancing local community knowledge of Princeton and of the successes of its "Family." The primary goal of the Princeton Club of Chicago is to create, strengthen, and expand relationships among Chicago-area alumni and the greater Princeton community

LOCATION

The Princeton Club of Chicago has no building. Meetings and events are held throughout the Chicago area, often downtown. The club has a website, <u>www.princetonclubofchicago.org</u>, which is an ideal way to join/manage your membership, sign up for events, see what's happening at the club, and find contact information for committee chairs in order to get more involved. The Club is volunteer-run but it has hired a local organization, Alumni Services, to handle administrative services, including mailings and assistance with event registration and membership, though we highly recommend visiting the website first. MEMBERSHIP

Membership is open to all undergraduate and graduate alumni, students, parents, and surviving spouses of deceased alumni. Membership benefits include newsletters, advance notice and priority for special events, and discounts on tickets for most club activities. Visit the club web site to sign up or renew your membership (you can also call Alumni Services to register by phone or fax). Membership is complimentary for members of the most recent graduating class, but you need to complete a membership form in order to receive all of our mailings.

ACTIVITIES

There are many ways to participate in the Club. Throughout the year the Club sponsors everything from sports outings to career networking, from social gatherings to talks by Princeton professors and alumni. Newsletters and bulletins, as well as the Club website, provide information on these. When you become a member, you will receive a new member packet detailing Club activities and committees. The packet includes a volunteer form; you can assist with annual giving, schools committee interviews, or planning events, among other activities. There are special interest groups such as Young Alumni, 30-Something, Graduate Alumni, Women's Network, and Parents. Princeton Club of Chicago 2016 Annual Report Presented at the April 14, 2016 Annual Dinner

Remarks by Robert J. Khoury '90, President

Good evening and Welcome to the 2016 Princeton Club of Chicago annual dinner. It is always an extraordinary event for our Club and this year, our 140th year since our founding, we have over 230 alums and guests coming together.

I'd like to welcome all this evening, especially our University trustees past and present (Bob Murley '72, James Yeh '87, Brian Johnson '99, Arnie Berlin '46, John McCarter, Jr. '60, and John Rogers, Jr. '80), and our distinguished speaker Professor Angus Deaton, our award recipients Rick Klein, Linda Ginzel and Boaz Keysar, alumni, parents, spouses, partners and guests. Thank you for whatever it took for you to make it here tonight. On behalf of the club, I want to say we appreciate that each and every one of you is here.

Most especially, I'd like to welcome the newly admitted class of 2020 – will you please stand up and be acknowledged?

Thank you. We have a very exciting and full program this evening.

First, I'll conduct a bit of Club business as we have a few elections that require your verbal vote. Then I will say a few words acknowledging our club's leaders and this year's accomplishments.

Our club is engaged in a wide variety of activities. The mission of the Princeton Club of Chicago is to serve our community, to serve the University and to serve our local alumni. To carry out this mission, we posted on our website, PrincetonClubofChicago.org, 54 events since our last dinner on April 23. These events are only made possible by the work of a dedicated leadership team, consisting of 55 Princetonian volunteers who meet every month. Leadership team please stand for a round of applause!

The officers and directors of the club are elected, and the officers are elected on a 2-year cycle.

Our by-laws were recently revised, and those revisions took effect on Tuesday, April 12th. In the revision of the by-laws, our process for electing members to our Board of Directors has changed. As a result, tonight we have to re-elect all of our existing board members to 3-,2-, and 1-year terms as shown in the Nominating section of this report. Could I ask all nominees to please stand?

Can I please have a motion to re-elect all of the directors listed in your packet? A second? All for? All against? Motion approved. Thank you.

For their tireless leadership and support, the Club wishes to thank retiring Officers, Committee Chairs, and Directors: Justin Chiles '05, VP of Technology who is relocating to Washington DC (please stand and stay standing); Kelsey Diao '04, Co-Chair of Membership who accepted a position in the suburbs (please stand and stay standing); Bruce Rosenberg '69, Co-Chair of PICS/Chicago Scholars who is staying on as a Director but is stepping down from his committee assignment (please stand and stay standing). Justin, Kelsey, and Bruce devoted significant time to the Club and we are most grateful for everything they've done! Everyone please applaud their efforts. Thank you.

Tonight, we would also like to acknowledge Oren Pollock Grad Alum *51. Up until last year, Oren selflessly co-led our Princeton in Chicago Schools or PICS efforts. For over 20 years he provided math teaching assistance at Roosevelt High School and at Roosevelt's graduation last June, he presented our PICS Scholarship Awards to graduating seniors. Years ago he joined more than 600 volunteers designated by the Chicago Board of Education to serve as principals for the day and engaged firsthand with public school administrators. He co-created the Alumni for Public Schools group with John Fish in 2001 to develop partnerships between alumni clubs in Chicago and local public high schools. He has been quoted as saying, "Those of us who have been fortunate enough to get a good college education must take the chance to help kids in public schools and maybe try to give something back." He served on Princeton's Alumni Council Committee on community service after graduation, and he has served as a longstanding and outspoken Leadership Group director. He has been an active volunteer for Princeton's grad alum Annual Giving efforts. At the Annual Dinner in 1998, he was presented with the Arnie Berlin Award for Service to Princeton. A true Princetonian in the Nation's service and in the service of Humanity. Oren please stand for a round of applause. Thank you.

The Princeton Club of Chicago had a banner year, and I'd like to take a moment to mention a few highlights:

In the realm of serving our community, we volunteered, mentored and ran a scholarship program for graduating students at Roosevelt High School, we assisted with Chicago Scholars in essay writing labs, and we funded scholarships to current Princeton students who qualify for financial aid for the 106th year. We mentored a number of P55 fellows who work in local non-profits and in coordination with Princeton Internships in Civic Service, we sponsored current Princeton students and provided them with stipends to work in Chicago nonprofits during the summer.

In the realm of serving the University, our Alumni Schools Committee, with 228 alumni volunteers managed to interview 100% of the 904 high school seniors from this region who applied to Princeton – a new record! And, this past year, our club won the S. Barksdale Penick, Jr. '25 Award recognizing our Alumni Schools Committee for our activities, enthusiasm, and imagination having most effectively realized the primary goals of schools committee work: to recruit outstanding candidates for Princeton, report skillfully on these candidates to the Admission Office, and to represent Princeton to its local community. The award would not be possible without all of you: you meet the challenge of an ever-expanding pool of applicants year after year, and you volunteer beyond your own town and city borders to make sure we achieve our goal of offering an interview to every single student who applies to Princeton from our part of Illinois. Thank you for your dedication and teamwork. Thank you also to our dynamite leadership team of Candace Jackson-Akiwumi '00, Charlene Huang Olson '88, Rick Woldenberg '81, Scott Strausser '83, Rudi Moreno '90, and Christine O'Neill '06, and to the Princeton Club of Chicago officers and board of directors who unfailingly support our

ASC efforts. Further, we ran the local Princeton Prize in Race Relations award ceremony, where current high school students who have undertaken work to bridge gaps among groups in their schools, neighborhoods, or communities are selected to win a cash prize and a trip to Princeton for a national symposium. Our local Annual Giving efforts supported the University's fundraising and our region continues to lead the nation in terms of participation.

And, finally the third part of our mission to serve our alumni!

Through 54 events we engaged local alumni, spouses, partners, parents and friends' minds, spirits, and sense of fun. This is unheard of among Princeton alumni clubs and is one of the reasons at reunions last year we accepted the prestigious Austin P. Leland Award for a record 5th time. This award recognizes general excellence in regional alumni activities to associations and clubs with more than 300 members! Here is but a sampling:

- Young alumni continue to be an active, engaged group hosting Happy Hours with other Ivies including a Winter Holiday Party in Hawaiian gear. Nice.
- Graduate school alumni enjoyed a Moroccan Soiree
- The Women's Group hosted Amy Casselberry Cuddy *05 discussing her bestselling book Presence and a discussion on women in entrepreneurship at Belle Spa and a luncheon with Anne-Marie Slaughter '80 discussing Unfinished Business: Women, Men, Work, Family.
- We held Career Networking events for Healthcare Professionals, Legal Eagles, and current Princeton students seeking summer internships.
- We enjoyed Dim Sum in Chinatown for Lunar New Year and a Diwali lunch celebration
- We participated in an LGBT Intercollegiate mixer
- Theater outings included Carousel at the Lyric, the musical "Join the Club", a Chicago Philharmonic Jazz Concert, Another Word for Beauty at the Goodman
- Our Parents' Committee sponsored a vibrant summer picnic held at Lakeshore Sport and Fitness, with hundreds of attendees, as well a reception for newly admitted students.
- To keep this brief, I won't mention our annual Family outing at Lakeshore, our Cubs outing, Precepts on Education in America, College Admissions, Bridge Year in India, Eating Club dinners featuring Costa Rican and Greek food, and the Alumni Shabbat Dinner.
- Lastly, I won't mention our inaugural Tiger Ball at the Waldorf Astoria on October 30 which had over 140 attendees and was as fun as could be. We had a ball at the Tiger Ball, didn't we?

Because of the hard work of the leadership team, all of this is possible and it creates bonds, opportunities, and a future of continued greatness for our community.

I would like to thank Mike Laidlaw '94, currently serving as Vice President, for his partnership, listening, and delightful sense of humor. Please stand to be acknowledged.

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES

Alumni Schools Committee (ASC) Vice President – Candace Jackson-Akiwumi '00

Many thanks to the 228 active volunteers (both undergraduate and graduate alumni of Princeton) who gave generously of their time to interview candidates throughout Chicagoland for Princeton's Class of 2020.

904 students from Chicagoland applied to Princeton – the first time our region broke the 900 mark for applicants. The City of Chicago had the highest number of applicants, followed by the Western Suburbs. Because of the sharp increase in applicants this year in several of our sub-regions (a phenomena Princeton ASC volunteers contended with across the world), several volunteers took on more interviews than ever before and helped to interview in regions other than their own. This teamwork is most appreciated and the key to our success as a committee. Ultimately, ASC volunteers interviewed or attempted to interview 100% of applicants.

Our dedicated, diligent regional chairs organize the tremendous effort that it is to interview every local applicant to Princeton each year:

- Scott Strausser '83 & Lauren Sykora '11 Western Suburbs
- Rudi Moreno '90 Northwest Suburbs
- Rick Woldenberg '81 Northern Suburbs

In addition to managing individual interviews, Western Suburbs chairs Scott Strausser '83 & Lauren Sykora '11 coordinated a January interview "blitz" in Oak Brook where 9 volunteers completed 38 interviews in one day. Similarly, Northwest Suburbs chair Rudi Moreno '90 coordinated a first-time February interview "blitz" in Barrington where 7 volunteers completed 28 interviews in one day.

The University sent admissions decisions in December (early action round) and at the end of March (regular decision round). The University admitted 47 students to the Class of 2020 from Chicago and the surrounding suburbs. All admitted students, regardless of when they were admitted, have until May 1 to respond to the University's offer of admission.

The University received 29,303 applications from across the world for admission to the Class of 2020. The University offered admission to 1,894 students, or 6.46 percent of these applicants, making this year the University's most selective admission year to date. Last year, the admission rate was 6.99 percent. The University expects to enroll a freshman class of 1,308 students.

According to the University's press release, the 1,894 admitted students this year hail from 151 countries; 49.5 percent are women and 50.5 percent are men; 50.6 percent self-identify as people of color, including biracial and multiracial students; 63 percent attend public schools; 17.5 percent will be the first in their families to attend college; and 11.2 percent are children of alumni. 21.2 percent of admitted students expressed wanting to study engineering, and 43.9 percent of those students are women. As many as 35 students are expected to defer their enrollment for a year to participate in

Princeton's Bridge Year Program which supports international service work abroad. Furthermore, 60 percent of the total student body receives need-based financial aid, compared with 38 percent in the Class of 2001, the last class to enroll before the University enhanced its financial aid program. The program now makes it possible for students to graduate debt free. University admission is need-blind, and the aid takes the form of grants, not loans.

To prepare for the interview season, in October 2015, approximately two dozen ASC volunteers attended an Admissions Interviewers' Roundtable with Assistant Dean of Admission Charlotte Burkly. Assistant Dean Burkly shared updates from campus, perspectives on college admissions, and tips for writing useful interview reports.

In addition to conducting interviews, ASC volunteers spread themselves among the region's many college fairs. In October 2015, ten volunteers represented Princeton at the 100 Black Men of Chicago College and Scholarships Fair in Chicago. Also in October, two volunteers each represented Princeton at the Coast-to-Coast College Fair in Oak Brook and the Chicago Public Schools Highly Selective School Fair. An additional volunteer represented Princeton at the Chicago Reception for Multicultural Students hosted by Harvard, Princeton, and Yale.

In March 2016, three ASC volunteers represented Princeton at the Lane Tech College Prep College Night in Chicago. In April 2016, several volunteers will represent Princeton at college fairs sponsored by the following Chicago high schools: Whitney Young, Jones College Preparatory, and Northside/Walter Payton/Von Steuben.

Finally, in April 2016, the Princeton Club of Chicago will host approximately 100 alumni, admitted students, and their families at a Reception for Newly Admitted Students. At the reception, we will congratulate all admitted students and introduce them to each other and the local Princeton alumni community. In advance, we thank hosts Robin and Peter Baugher '70, each of our ASC regional chairs, and Parents' Committee chairs, Carol and David Stone P17 and Liz and Jeff Sharp '80 P14 P18, for coordinating the event.

We also look forward to sending off all students headed to Princeton this fall at the Princeton Club summer picnic, coordinated by the Parents' Committee with support from ASC leadership. We had a wonderful turnout of incoming freshmen, their families, and alumni at the August 2015 picnic at Lakeshore Fitness.

Annual Giving Committee Vice President – Chris Yarbrough '96

In 2014-15, the Chicago area proved once again that it is one of the best Annual Giving regions in the country, raising over \$3.6 million of the Princeton Annual Giving Campaign's \$61 million total. The Chicago region's annual giving participation average was 65.8%.

Chicago's excellent performance was the work of a group of dedicated volunteers. Chris Yarbrough '96 and Mike Laidlaw '94 oversaw the campaign. Their thanks go out to everyone who helped, and especially to those who participated in the campaign.

The 2015-16 campaign is shifting into high gear and the Chicago team encourages you to think about giving. Your gifts go to support the University's essential mission - providing young men and women with one of the best educations in the country. Please also consider joining the Chicago AG team,

Linda Ginzel *89 and Boaz Keysar *89

After their 16-month old son was killed in a recalled portable crib at his Chicago licensed childcare home, Linda and Boaz co-founded Kids in Danger, a non-profit organization dedicated to improving children's product safety. Together, they received the President's Service Award from President Clinton, the nation's highest honor for volunteer service directed at solving critical social problems.

Linda is a clinical professor of managerial psychology at the University of Chicago Booth School of Business. Linda received her MA and PhD. from Princeton University in experimental social psychology and her BA in psychology with distinction and Summa Cum Laude from the University of Colorado. She held previous faculty appointments at both Stanford University's Graduate School of Business and Northwestern University's Kellogg Graduate School of Management. In addition, Linda has served as a director of Consumers Union, the non-profit publisher of Consumer Reports, and served on President Obama's Transition Team as a member of the Consumer Product Safety Commission Advisory Committee.

Boaz is a professor of psychology and Chair of the Cognition program at the University of Chicago. He received his Ph.D. from Princeton University in 1989 and was a visiting scholar at Stanford University before joining the faculty at the University of Chicago in 1991. He studies the relationship between decision-making and language. Professor Keysar's honors and awards include a John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation Fellowship and a Fulbright Scholarship. For his advocacy work, Boaz has been named Chicagoan of the Year and was awarded the Community Advocate Hope and Courage Award by Lurie Children's Hospital.

Tutoring in the classroom continues, and we marked six years of awarding Princeton Club of Chicago PICS Scholarships to graduating seniors. Since 1988, the Princeton Club of Chicago Scholarship Fund has awarded scholarships totaling over \$2 million. I am pleased to report that scholarships have been awarded this year by the University to six outstanding undergraduates from the Chicago area. Princeton's Recording Secretary, H. Kirk Unruh, Jr. '70, reports that the university expects to award \$139 M in need-based financial aid to roughly 60% of the undergraduates, or 3,000 students. The average financial aid package is \$48,600, made up of \$46,350 in grant aid and \$2,250 from a campus job. Nearly 80% of the awards will come from endowed Princeton scholarships like our Chicago scholarship fund. Assuming our recipients each received the average package, that totals \$291,600 in financial aid, 80% (\$233,280) of which was contributed from our scholarship fund.

The Scholarship Fund's contributions are part of a broader effort to allow the most outstanding candidates to attend Princeton, whatever their circumstances. It also permits Princeton students to benefit from the economic, and diversity so critical to the educational process. Princeton continues to offer admissions to undergraduates solely on the basis of merit. This is due to the continuing support of generous alums and friends of Princeton.

On behalf of the Princeton Club of Chicago Scholarship Fund, I would like to thank those who have contributed in the past for your support and to ask you (as well as those who have not contributed before), to give consideration to making a gift this year.

Treasurer's Report Treasurer – Albert Chan '91 The Princeton Club of Chicago attempts to operate on a breakeven basis each year, supported by dues (including extra support from our generous patrons and benefactors) and event fees. We expect to end this fiscal year in good financial shape. Thanks to our members and event planners we host a variety of well-attended events, including the inaugural Tiger Ball this year. Our event booking and online payment system at the Club's web site was recently upgraded to accommodate mobile devices, further facilitating membership renewal and event registration.

Members' dues support the newsletter, event mailings, administration of the Club's membership, and selected event subsidies. Each year, the Club also supports Princeton in Chicago Schools (PICS), the Scholarship Fund, Princeton Project '55 (Alumni Corps), and the Princeton Prize in Race Relations.
